You earn a wedge by answering trivia questions correctly. The first person to get to the center of the board and answer the final question correctly, wins. Board Games	Taboo	Take turns getting your team to guess as many keywords as possible before the timer runs out. Each card has a list of "taboo" words which may not be used to describe the key word. For example, someone may have to describe "football" without saying "football", "team", "quarterback", "game", or "receiver".	Create your own taboo game and make a communication modality a "taboo." For example, you need to describe the key word, but you're only allowed to write. Or you're only allowed to gesture (it may quickly turn into a game of Charades!)
Board Games	Outburst	Each team is given a topic and one minute to yell out as many answers as they can that might be listed on the topic card. Each time you yell out one of the answers, you score a point for your team.	Take turns, but when the person generating the words within a category could not come up with anymore items, the other person gives clues for the remaining words (i.e. Marylin Monroe; "The lady whose skirt blew up").

Board Games	Scattergories	Each person gets a card with a list of categories. Once you roll the dice, you have to quickly fill out your list with answers that begin with the same letter. You score a point if no other players match your answer.	Start without a timer and just fill out as many categories as you can. Don't expect to fill in the entire list.
Board Games	Clue	Players take turns attempting to figure out what 3 cards are hidden in the secret envelope. Each player can ask questions and request cards.	
TV Show	Jeopardy	Play along with Jeopardy! Try to answer the questions after each clue is read.	Create your own Jeopardy game using topics you are interested in or targeting in therapy (i.e., family names, places, verbs, compound words, synonyms, etc.)
TV Show	America Says	Each team is given a clue and the top seven answers with fill-in-the-blanks. Each team has to try to fill in all the answers before the clock runs out. For example the clue may be "My favorite thing made with potatoes is" and an answer might be "F"	
TV Show	The Chase	Answer a variety of questions during the game as contestants compete to add more money to their bank.	
TV Show	MasterMind	Play along and try to answer as many questions correctly within a set amount of time in a given category that the contestant picks.

PWA Created Games	Family Names	Practice naming the people in your family	Consider writing the names or even making a Family Tree to help with the names AND their relationships (i.e., sister, brother, uncle, etc.) as these are often tricky to say as well!
PWA Created Games	Labeling	Practice labeling everything you see around you (e.g., Tree, mailbox, tv, clouds, grass, etc.)	Once you get better at labeling things, talk about what you see around you (i.e., what it looks like, what color or shape, what can you do with it)
PWA Created Games	20 Questions	One person thinks of an object and the other person has to ask Y/N questions in order to guess the object.	One person thinks of an object or specific person, and provides clues (i.e., it's yellow, you peel it, monkeys eat it), while the other participant makes guesses.

PWA Created Games	A-Z	Generate a word that start with each letter of the Alphabet, go in order of the Alphabet (A-Z)	Add a category: All the words you generate must fit in a specific category such as cities, famous people, flowers, fruits, animals, movies, or cocktails. Add parts of speech: Generate a two-word combination that starts with each letter such as verb & object ("accept assignment"), noun & verb ("baker bakes"), or adjective & noun ("cuddly cat").

PWA Created Games	Rhyming	Generate a list of rhyming words	Take turns with a communication partner generating rhyming words.

Try singing along to your favorite song, or take turns singing parts of lyrics, asking the person with Aphasia to fill in key words or lines. Sing along to favorite TV show theme song
PWA Created Games	Camera Roll	Flip through the camera roll or pictures on your phone or iPad, and take turns creating sentences about the pictures.	
PWA Created Games	TV or Movie	Watch a favorite show and movie, and have a conversation about the characters, what they're doing, and the places they go.	
PWA Created Games	□	Create "cards" that have a variety of shapes in different locations on the card. Then, each person takes a turn selecting a card and trying to describe the card to the second player. The second player must try to draw what the first player is describing. For example (Picture to the left): "Put a square in the top left corner of the page. Draw a circle in the middle of the page. In the middle of the circle draw a diamond. Put a triangle in the bottom right corner of the page."
